## Helping To Bridge The Gap

Up until the time at which I am writing this, just after Christmas, the most difficult question which I have been asked concerns what differences there are between life in England and America. This question is hard to answer because there seems to be no one big difference. Rather there are numerous small ones which combine to make life over here quite different from life at home.

For instance, sports have a much more professional approach, with long daily sessions, paid coaches, large crowds at the games, and a great emphasis on winning. At home, we would only have one practice a week and no coverage from the local paper. The important sporting events in England are those of the town teams with students from the schools often taking part. The big school sports are rugby, soccer, and cricket for the boys and tennis, netball, and field hockey for the girls.

Another difference is that while we do have quite a number of grocery supermarkets in England, there still are numerous small grocery and butcher shops owned by single proprietors.

However, there is one possible difference which I hope is nonexistent. That is that I hope the reception that a student from another country would receive in England would be similar to that which I have had here.

Somehow, to my great regret, I doubt it, because it would be very difficult to equal the reception which you have given to me. It's something I am very grateful for and for which I would like to thank everyone. Paul Roberts

By living with these people, by getting used to their unsanitary conditions, and by living their customs and traditions, I learned to understand the Filipinos.

Hopefully through me, our nation and its people have been brought closer to the people of the Philippines. I believe a good example of the closeness that AFS brings out is embodied on an inscription on a gift to me from the faculty of my school which read:
"'You came, you saw, you conquered' us with your ready smile and sincere efforts to make friends.

"We look forward to the day when you will come back to us, not only as an American, but also as a Filipino".
