
Business is the most popular field of study among male college undergraduates. It is the second most popular field of study among college undergraduates, both men and women.

#### Honored Honors


Each year awards are presented to those students who have demonstrated outstanding efforts in one or more academic areas.




Each year the Hornell Alumni Association sponsors the Homecoming halftime ceremonies.

The Junior class advisor Miss Gail Mularz added a special feature to the entertainment by singing the theme song "You Light Up My Life".









## FTA: Giving Is Gaining



This year will long be remembered as the comeback season for the Hornell team. Their dedication and spirit will remain an inspiration to all future athletes.





The team will lose eight seniors to graduation but Coach Yvonne Lefferts is looking forward to the upcoming J.V.'s who as of this time are undefeated.














Waves have been splashing for the Hornell High swim team this season. This year's finmen have shown their ability to perform under pressure.

Coach Lefferts is looking forward to championships in league and sectional play for the 1978 season.





