The Varsity baseball team, under the direction of coach James Farrell, became the Sullivan Trail Champions.




This gave the Raiders an overall record of 13-6, with 11 wins and 3 losses in Sullivan Trail play.
















After several decisive wins in the Sullivan Trail League, it was clear that the team was on the way to a big season.


